


Q1 Does your state have an apprentice license type or license category for new applicators? If yes and it is category specific, please include the categories in the comment box.



7	Apprentices in Florida are considered Pest Control Employee ID Cardholders. They're allowed to make applications of pesticides under the direct supervision of a Certified Pest Control Operator. 8	We have Registered Technicians (designated as Category 60) which could be considered similar to an apprentice (new applicator). 



3	The APCAPC must pass our Laws, Regulations, and Basic Principles core exam and either the Manned or Unmanned Apprentice Pest Control Pilot exam with scores of 70% or higher to successfully obtain a certificate.	6/26/2020 6:15 PM



2	Supervision requirements are dependent on the pesticide being applied, label requirements, permit conditions, and site conditions. The certified Journeyman Pilot (Journeyman Pest Control Aircraft Pilot Certificate) supervising the Apprentice Pilot may need to be located on site while the application is taking place or may need to be readily available by phone depending on the type of application. In all cases, the Apprentice Pilot must be able to contact the supervising Journeyman Pilot immediately.	6/26/2020 6:15 PM

4	The supervisor must be available within a reasonable timeframe. For example, supervisor should be available by phone immediately and able to get to the site within 3 hours or less.	6/26/2020 11:42 AM

#	WHAT ARE THE DRAWBACKS?	DATE
1	Implemented 15-20 years ago in response to misuse complaints. Prior to the license category being added, only one person at a facility needed to have any license at all. Now every applicator must at least have some testing (core) and be supervised by a fully certified applicator.	6/27/2020 10:16 AM
2	No drawbacks. This is not a stand-alone license, but a training requirement for unlicensed (but supervised) applicators of pesticides in category 7. It serves as an additional level of training / protection in applying pesticides in environments where the public would most likely be impacted negatively by a misapplication.	6/27/2020 10:06 AM
3	Licensed Pest Control Businesses (PCBs) that perform pest control using an aircraft must employ an individual holding a valid Journeyman Pest Control Aircraft Pilot Certificate (JPCAPC). In order to obtain a JPCAPC, an Apprentice Pilot must first serve under a certified Journeyman Pilot for one year. This may burden an apprentice or a pest control business to find a certified Journeyman Pilot that is available to supervise an Apprentice Pilot. This may sometimes cause difficulties as there is not an abundance of available pest control pilots and pest control aircraft operations are typically driven by seasonal demands. California has recently developed an Unmanned Pest Control Aircraft Pilot Certificate for both Apprentice and Journeyman unmanned aircraft (drone) pest control pilots. Currently, there are very few Unmanned Pest Control Aircraft Pilot Certificates issued since it is a new certificate. California laws and regulations require an Apprentice Pilot to be supervised for at least one year by a certified Journeyman Pilot and complete at least 50 hours of pest control operations by unmanned aircraft. Currently, an Unmanned Apprentice Pest Control Pilot may have difficulties finding an Unmanned Journeyman Pest Control Pilot to supervise them since it is a new certificate category and very few unmanned pilots have reached journeyman level. For this reason, Journeyman pest control pilots of manned aircrafts are currently supervising Apprentice unmanned pilots, until more unmanned pest control pilots meet the requirements to be certified as a Journeyman Pilot.	6/26/2020 6:15 PM

5	Lack of direct oversight; relying on licensed applicators for more than the basic pesticide training (no exam) required.	6/26/2020 11:42 AM
6	While no drawbacks, the Registered Technician program was originally put in place to provide new applicators with the required one year experience to be eligible to become a certified Commercial Applicator. There are applicators who remain Registered Technicians for their entire careers and not become certified Commercial Applicators.	6/26/2020 11:16 AM
7	This license type was initiated in 2011 and received objection from individuals that, prior to its establishment, had to satisfy a five-year experience requirement to satisfy eligibility to take a pesticide exam at the supervisory level.	6/26/2020 9:46 AM

9	The apprentice requirement is needed because of the inherent dangers associated with dispensing pesticides from the air. 2	Maine used to have a two year experience/apprenticeship requirement for the master/supervisory license. This pertained to all categories of licensure. There was also a waiver process. Applicants seeking a waiver had their requests reviewed by Maine's pesticide policy board. Monthly meetings of the board were dominated by waiver application reviews. The board was granting all waivers and the necessity/benefit of the experience requirement came into question. Ultimately, the experience requirement was dropped and the master certification process was strengthened.	6/26/2020 11:50 AM
3	During the current COVID emergency we are unable to provide exams for new licensed applicators so our "operator" license has allowed licensed applicators to engage these individuals to help with work - under their supervision.	6/26/2020 11:42 AM
4	Each scenario for Florida's pesticide applicator ID cardholders and certifications vary greatly so if you have additional questions or need clarification, please don't hesitate to reach out.	6/26/2020 11:24 AM
5	One final note, the certification period for Registered Technicians is the same as for Commercial Applicators (2 years). In addition, the recertification requirements is also the same (applicators are required to take one recertification course every 2 years). All applicators must be certified as a Registered Technician or Commercial Applicator to apply pesticides in the State. 7	The license type is "Supervisory Registration Certificate - General Use". Two eight-hour classes (one class of core instruction and one class of category specific instruction) are required to qualify to take the exam. Both a written and oral exam are required.
